Robilant+Voena is pleased to announce an **exhibition of works by Pascale Marthine Tayou** in their London gallery. The exhibition is organised in **collaboration with Galleria Continua**, coinciding with a **major retrospective** at their gallery in Les Moulins, France, and features new works alongside examples of some of the Cameroonian artist's most celebrated series from the past ten years. This is the **first time** that Tayou will have a **solo gallery presentation in the UK**, where he has previously been recognised with solo institutional exhibitions at the **Serpentine Galleries (2015)**, and **MK Gallery (2007–8)**, as well as an Artist Room at **Tate Modern (2023–24)**. Robilant+Voena's exhibition offers an exciting opportunity to see work by this renowned international artist in London, who was recently awarded the **Grand Prix de Sculpture from the Académie des Beaux-Arts in France**.

Opening during Frieze Week, Robilant+Voena will dedicate its London gallery to **twelve works** by Tayou. The selection reflects the artist's multifaceted practice, working across media and transferring his visual investigations effortlessly between themes as wide-ranging as consumerism, colonialism, the environment, cultural identity, and childhood to name but a few – always taking himself as a person as the starting point for his works. Reflecting Tayou's belief in the intertwined nature of life and art, many of the works incorporate

ephemera, found materials, and cultural artefacts representing Tayou's Central African heritage and his experiences living, travelling and working in Europe.

The artist's mastery of storytelling and visual subversion is a constant through the works in the exhibition. Large-scale works such as *Dirty Mirror* (2015), *Calabasses* (2015) and *Step by Step* (2023–25) incorporate common objects to engage with issues such as self-perception and rampant consumerism, while *Flipflop Chalks* (2025) recasts the traditional use of the medium into a pastel-hued field that ebbs and flows between painting and sculpture. The selection also includes two examples from Tayou's *Alphabête series* (both 2016), which shows the plurality of the artist's speeches and examines the differences between oral and written traditions, and *Invasion* (2024), which comprises a map of Africa peppered with darts bearing the flags of European colonizing nations. Also on display are examples of the artist's distinctive crystal masks, symbolising the ancestral spirits in Tayou's practice, and also suggesting the complexity of modern identity.

In addition to **solo exhibitions at museums and institutions internationally**, including at the Cultural Foundation, Abu Dhabi (2023); Mu.ZEE Ostend (2018 and 2019); BOZAR, Brussels (2015); MACRO, Rome (2012); MUDAM Luxembourg (2011); and the Palais de Tokyo, Paris (2002), the artist's work features in **prestigious collections worldwide** including Albright Knox Art Gallery, Buffalo; Centre Pompidou, Paris; Cleveland Museum of Art, Cleveland; MAC Lyon; MACRO, Rome; MAXXI, Rome; MUDAM, Luxembourg; National Gallery of Victoria, Melbourne; Pinault Collection, Paris; Solomon R. Guggenheim Museum, Abu Dhabi; SMAK, Ghent; Tate Modern, London.




Pascale Marthine Tayou was born in Nkongsamba, Cameroon in 1966. Since the beginning of the 1990s and his participation in Documenta 11 (2002) in Kassel and at the Venice Biennale (2005 and 2009), Tayou has been known among a wide international public. His work is characterized by its variability, since he does not confine himself in his artistic work to one medium, material or subject. Instead, each artwork uses the artist himself as a person as their point of departure. Even at the very outset of his career, Pascale Marthine Tayou changed his name to incorporate a feminine ending, thus distancing himself from the importance of artistic authorship and male/female ascriptions.

The variability of his practice applies also to geography and cultural origin as well. His works not only mediate in this sense between various experiences, perspectives and backgrounds, but are produced in the knowledge that they are social, cultural, or political constructions. His work is deliberately mobile, elusive, and linked to the idea of travel and of coming into contact with that which is other to oneself, and is often so spontaneous that it seems casual. All works by Tayou have a recurrent feature in common: they dwell upon an individual moving through the world and exploring the issue of origins and related expectations.

The artist lives and works in Ghent, Belgium and in Yaoundé, Cameroon.
